

A MESSAGE FROM HMSA PRESIDENT MARINIS PIRPIRIS

Building networks with local, national and international organisations.

Professor Dennis Velakoulis and Dr Nick Christellis provided a wonderful insight into the biological basis of mental wellbeing and the causes of acute and chronic pain. It was terrific to see so many members enjoy an evening of learning and networking at the GPO in Kew. The HMSA is committed to lifting the veil on these sensitive areas and eroding the stigma associated with mental health. Alzheimer's is another important aspect with an interface between cognitive and physical wellbeing. We will be co-hosting the World Alzheimer Day Symposium on the 22nd September with Fronditha Care at Oakleigh Grammar. You are all welcome to attend and help make the day a great success. You are also welcome to bring interested friends and relatives.

We have been blessed with the opportunity to meet with the newly elected leader of the Greek Orthodox Church of Australia, His Eminence Archbishop Makarios on the 10th August. He was born in Herakleion, Crete and completed his ecclesiastical studies at the Rizareios Ecclesiastical School of Athens and graduated at the Higher Ecclesiastical School of Athens and the Theological School of the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens. We were impressed with his wisdom and humility as he has graduated as a Master of Sacred Theology (Boston), Master of Arts (Harvard), and Master of Bioethics (Monash). His dissertation was passed with Excellence at the Medical School of the University of Crete and was entitled "Cloning: Social, Ethical and Theological Components". We discussed the vision of the HMSA, described our work and discussed a number of opportunities for collaboration in the education of our broader community of Hellenic Origin. We were graciously invited to attend the forthcoming meeting of the Clergy on the 24th October, to further discuss and develop these ideas. This will help improve our reach into the broader community. His Eminence was also the very worthy recipient of the HMSA's inaugural award of excellence for work in the field of Ethics.

The executive will be meeting with the Minister of Health and the Minister for Ambulance Services, Ms Jenny Mikakos, MP on the 29th August. The meeting will provide the executive an opportunity to introduce the HMSA and develop areas for collaboration. The HMSA is committed to improving services for all Australians, including those of Hellenic descent, and will discuss the additional services required to provide an ability for our patients, at the varying stages of their lives, to remain healthy, maintain their functional independence and improve their wellbeing and quality of life.

The HMSA is also preparing for a visit from the International Health Tourism Centre. Greek doctors representing a number of specialty and sub-speciality areas are planning to visit Australia in order to build on the networks and friendships from their previous visit. They are planning an engaging program, where they will share their current projects as well as their ideas and vision for a Greece that re-establishes itself as a leader in health care delivery.

As the activities of the HMSA are expanding we have also commenced the process of appointing a secretariat, which will provide the Board with an improved ability to program. The secretariat will also be tasked with the organisation of the upcoming HMSA trip to Greece, with visits to a number of sites of historical and cultural interest. There will also be a symbolic pledging of the Hippocratic oath within the historical remains of the Asklepieion in Kos. More details will follow in the near future. The upcoming launch of our on-line doctor directory will provide an ability for everyone to identify doctors with interests in particular sub-speciality areas. Further information will be available soon. I would encourage all members to consider registering for this directory.

The Hellenic Medical Society of Australia (HMSA) recently hosted a medical educational evening for its professional members entitled 'Brain and Pain'.

Doctors from various specialities as well as general practitioners packed out a function room at the QPO restaurant to be informed on the latest updates on the brain and on the topic of chronic pain management.

HMSA president A/Professor Marinis Pirpiris introduced the evening and welcomed the generous sponsors of the evening Servier Pharmaceuticals and Delphi Bank. MC Dr Arthur Kokkinias (HMSA Secretary) in turn warmly introduced each of the keynote speakers of the evening.

The 'Brain' part of the evening was presented by Professor Dennis Velakoulis, neuropsychiatrist and director of the Neuropsychiatry Unit at the Royal Melbourne Hospital. He updated the audience on the





Meeting between Archbishop Makarios and HMSA

His Eminence Archbishop of Australia Makarios, during his recent stay in Melbourne, met with the HMSA Board. His Grace Bishop Ezekiel of Dervis was also present.

Archbishop Makarios is a graduate of the Higher Ecclesiastical School of Athens and of the Theological School of the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens. He completed post-graduate studies at the Universities of Boston, (Master of Sacred Theology), Harvard, (Master of Arts), and Monash, (Master of Bioethics), whilst his successful doctoral dissertation was undertaken at the Medical School of the University of Crete. The work was published under the title, "Cloning: Social, Ethical and Theological Components".

Since 2003 he has been teaching at the Patriarchal Academy of Crete. In tandem, visiting Professor to various Universities, including the Theological College of Holy Cross in Boston, the University of Tartu and the Medical Schools of the Universities of Crete, Thessaly and Athens. He has recently been elected and enthroned Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of Australia after previously serving as a Bishop in the Church of Estonia.

In a welcoming and friendly meeting, the Archbishop was informed of the vision and the accomplishments of the HMSA.

The HMSA president, Associate Professor Marinis Pirpiris welcomed His Eminence and informed him of the history of the Society and its aims. Following this was a personal introduction from each of the members of the Board.

The HMSA secretary, Dr Arthur Kokkinias, continued with a presentation of the various achievements of the HMSA as well as a proposal for formal cooperation between the Archdiocese and the HMSA for the purposes of educational and informative sessions on health to the public. To date, the HMSA has presented a plethora of free public lectures on different topics concerning healthcare in general. The Archbishop was enthusiastic about the proposal.

Similarly, His Eminence was also supportive of the proposal for a future medical conference on bioethics, with a variety of speakers, with the keynote speaker being the Archbishop himself. Topics such as abortion, euthanasia and stem cell research, as well as the stigma associated with psychiatric illnesses and suicide, were also discussed as areas of concern and division amongst medical professionals.

The next presentation was given by the Society's Treasurer, Associate Professor Arthur Nasis, who informed the Archbishop of the involvement and activities of the HMSA in the political arena, with the aim of advocating for the interests of the Greek community with respect to health. He also informed His Eminence on the upcoming meeting of the HMSA with the Health Minister, the Honourable Jenny Mikakos.

The Vice President of the HMSA, Dr George Stabelos, presented to the Archbishop on the needs of the elderly of our community, in particular of Greek migrants. He raised the specific medical, social and psychological problems affecting the Greek Australian elderly, in particular social isolation, and the lack of community support programs.

Paediatrician and HMSA communications officer Dr Betty Messazos-Trapetsa continued with an informative presentation on the needs and problems of children and adolescents, and in particular of new migrants from Greece. She emphasized that the main problems that younger people face are psychological and social and not necessarily medical. She also raised the issue of the ever increasing obesity epidemic amongst children and adolescents. The Archbishop was interested to hear about the issues affecting both young people and their parents.

During the meeting, the Archbishop was awarded with the first HMSA award for his contributions to the fields of bioethics and theology. At the conclusion of the meeting he personally greeted each member of the Board warmly, affirming that the Church would be willing to embrace cooperation with science, and in particular, with medicine.

The Church, as well as the HMSA agree that somatic, psychological, social and spiritual aspects of health are all of utmost importance, and that quality education to the general public around topics of preventative health, early diagnosis and treatment of various illnesses is imperative.

Congratulations to our new Archbishop for his progressive vision and inclusiveness. Axios!

Ιλαρά: Τι πρέπει να γνωρίζουμε για το εμβόλιό της

Τη Δευτέρα, 17 Ιουνίου 2019, η Παιδίατρος Μπέτη Μεσάζου-Τραπέτσα μίλησε στο 3ΧΥ και την εκπομπή «Πρωινό Μαγκαζίνο» για τον ιό της ιλαράς.

Η Αυστραλία δεν ανήκει, ως γνωστό, στις χώρες με υψηλό αριθμό κρουσμάτων ιλαράς, ωστόσο το πρόβλημα απασχόλησε τις Υγειονομικές Αρχές και τα Μέσα Ενημέρωσης, ύστερα από τον εντοπισμό μολυσμένου από τη νόσο Ταϊλανδού τουρίστα που έφτασε στη χώρα μας στις αρχές του Ιανουαρίου 2019.

«Η ιλαρά, είπε η κα Μεσάζου-Τραπέτσα, είναι μια ιογενής λοίμωξη του αναπνευστικού συστήματος και προκαλείται από έναν ιό RNA. Είναι εξαιρετικά μεταδοτική και πολύ σοβαρή ίωση καθώς οι επιπλοκές μπορούν να κινούνται από ήπιες ως και πιο σοβαρές, όπως πνευμονία ή εγκεφαλίτιδα, οι οποίες, όταν πρόκειται για μικρά παιδιά ή για ενήλικες που δεν έχουν εμβολιαστεί ολοκληρωτικά σε μικρότερη ηλικία είναι πολύ σοβαρές.

Σύμφωνα με τα στοιχεία που έχουμε 1 στα 15 παιδιά ενδέχεται να αναπτύξει πνευμονία και ένα άτομο στα 1.000 ενδέχεται να αναπτύξει εγκεφαλίτιδα, με συνέπεια να του προκληθούν σοβαρές και μόνιμες βλάβες, ακόμη και ο θάνατος. Οσον αφορά τα συμπτώματα, είναι κλασικά. Ξεκινούν με πυρετό, βήχα , ρινική καταρροή, κόκκινα μάτια, πονόλαιμο. Μερικές ημέρες αργότερα εμφανίζεται ένα εξάνθημα που παραμένει περίπου για 8 ημέρες, οπότε έχουν περάσει 3-4 ημέρες που πρωτοεμφανίζονται τα συμπτώματα και οι γονείς έχουν ενημερωθεί από τον παθολόγο τους, ενώ πιθανόν να έχουν αρχίσει την αντιβίωση. Συγχρόνως όμως εμφανίζεται το εξάνθημα και πολλοί νομίζουν ότι αυτό είναι μια αλλεργική αντίδραση στην αντιβίωση.

Το εξάνθημα της ιλαράς εμφανίζεται μετά από τα πρώτα συμπτώματα και μπορεί να παραμείνει μέχρι και μια εβδομάδα, ενώ το αρχικά ανοιχτό κόκκινο χρώμα μεταβάλλεται βαθμηδών σε σκούρο καφέ.

Έτσι η μολυσματική περίοδος αυτής της αρχής, των 2-4 ημερών είναι μέχρι 2-5 ημέρες μετά το εξάνθημα. Οπότε ένα παιδί, πηγαίνοντας στον παιδικό σταθμό, ή ένας ενήλικος μπορεί να μεταδώσει την ασθένεια. Γι' αυτό είναισημαντική και τόσο μεταδοτική, λόγω του ότι ο ιός

μπορεί να ζήσει ώρες αν όχι ημέρες πάνω σε επιφάνειες».

Για το πώς μεταδίδεται ο ιός, η κα Μεσάζου-Τραπέτσα μας είπε: «Ως επί το πλείστον ο ιός μεταδίδεται με την αναπνοή, μέσω σταγονιδίων από το βήχα και το φτέρνισμα, με αποτέλεσμα όταν κάποιος υγιής έρθει σε επαφή με τα υγρά από τη μύτη και το στόμα ενός μολυσμένου ανθρώπου, να προσβάλλεται από τον ιό.

Είναι εξαιρετικά μεταδοτικός, καθώς 90% των ανθρώπων που έχουν φαινομενικά ανοσία αλλά μοιράζονται τον ίδιο χώρο σε ένα μολυσμένο περιβάλλον, θα νοσήσουν επειδή, όπως προαναφέραμε, επιβιώνει ο ιός στον αέρα και πάνω σε μερικές επιφάνειες για μερικές ώρες». Στο ερώτημα γιατί η νόσος είναι περισσότερο σοβαρή σε βρέφη και ενήλικες η κα Μεσάζου- Τραπέτσα τόνισε: «Εχει να κάνει με το ανοσοποιητικό σύστημα του



κάθε ανθρώπου, π.χ τα μικρά παιδιά έως και 6 μηνών έχουν μέχρι ένα σημείο αντισώματα από τη μητέρα, γι' αυτό και ο εμβολιασμός του πρώτου σταδίου της ιλαράς γίνεται σε ηλικία 12-18 μηνών ενώ το δεύτερο στάδιο αργότερα.

Αυτό γίνεται για να προετοιμαστεί το σώμα να αντιμετωπίσει με επιτυχία μια διαφορετική μορφή του ιού στα πρώτα χρόνια εάν ο ιός επανεμφανιστεί.

Αυτές οι δύο ηλικίες, η βρεφική καιη νηπιακή, είναι πολύ σημαντικές στο να έχει ετοιμαστεί το ανοσοποιητικό σύστημα. Το αντίθετο παρατηρείται σε ενήλικες των οποίων το σώμα δεν έχει προετοιμαστεί με εμβολιασμό για την αντιμετώπιση του ιού.

Στην Αυστραλία τα ποσοστά του εμβολιασμού έχουν πέσει γενικώς. Από το 1974 και μέσω της καμπάνιας του εμβολιασμού μέχρι το '80 το πρόβλημα είχε αντιμετωπιστεί και η Αυστραλία δεν είχε

υψηλα κρουσματα ιλαρας

Ωστόσο το πρόβλημα είναι οι τουρίστες, όπως, πρόσφατα, ένας μολυσμένος από τον ιό τουρίστας από την Ταϊλάνδη, μετέδωσε τη νόσο σε πολλά άτομα.

Εδώ να επανέλθουμε και πάλι στο εξάνθημα και να συμπληρώσουμε ότι το χαρακτηριστικό εξάνθημα της ιλαράς είναι ερυθηματώδες και εμφανίζεται πρώτα πίσω από τα αυτιά, μετά στο κεφάλι και το λαιμό και στη συνέχεια εξαπλώνεται και καλύπτει το μεγαλύτερο μέρος του σώματος, όπου και προκαλεί τη φαγούρα.

Και κάτι άλλο: κατά τη διάρκεια της εξέτασης μέσω των λυμφαδένων που βρίσκονται στο πίσω μέρος της κεφαλής μπορεί να γίνει η σωστή διάγνωση, δηλαδή πότε εμφανίστηκαν τα πρώτα συμπτώματα, πότε εμφανίστηκε το εξάνθημα, οπότε καταλαβαίνουμε ότι το άτομο πάσχει από τον ιό της ιλαράς».

Στην ερώτηση «όταν ένα άτομο προσβληθεί από την ασθένεια της ιλαράς ποιές είναι οι πλέον επικίνδυνες ημέρες μετάδοσής της», η κα Μεσάζου-Τραπέτσα είπε: «Υπάρχει η προδρομική περίοδος, η οποία ξεκινά πριν 9-12 ημέρες από την αρχική έκθεση στον ιό. Το χρονικό διάστημα που χρειάζεται να εκδηλώσει την ασθένεια ένα παιδί που έχει έρθει σε επαφή με τον ιό είναι περίπου 10 ημέρες, κατά της οποίας εμφανίζονται όλα τα συμπτώματα.

Ωστόσο, η μολυσματική περίοδος είναι περίπου 2-4 πριν από την εμφάνιση του εξανθήματος και 2-5 ημέρες μετά. Δηλαδή, η μολυσματική περίοδος ενδέχεται να κρατήσει 4-9 ημέρες».

Για το κατά πόσο ισχύει το εμβόλιο σε άτομα που έχουν εμβολιαστεί εδώ και πολλά χρόνια ή θα πρέπει να εμβολιαστούν δεύτερη φορά, η κα Μεσάζου-Τραπέτσα είπε: «Σε αναπτυγμένες χώρες, όπως στην Αυστραλία τα περισσότερα παιδιά εμβολιάζονται κατά την ηλικία 12 έως 18 μηνών με το τριπλό εμβόλιο της ιλαράς, παρωτίτιδας και ερυθράς. Σε γενικές γραμμές ο εμβολιασμός δεν γίνεται νωρίτερα διότι διατηρούν τα αντισώματα της ασθένειας που μεταδίδει η μητέρα.

Ωστόσο, η δεύτερη δόση μεταξύ 4-5 ετών αυξάνει το ποσοστό της ανοσίας. Τα ποσοστά του εμβολιασμού, παρόλο που υπάρχουν ομάδες ανθρώπων που τάσσονται κατά του εμβολιασμού, είναι αρκετά υψηλά.

Εδώ ας συμπληρώσουμε ότι δεν υπάρχει

μία επιστημονική έρευνα πίσω από όλες τις θεωρίες που θέλουν να πιστεύουν. Συνιστάται σε γονείς που έχουν ορισμένους προβληματισμούς σχετικά με τον εμβολιασμό, ή έχουν κάποιες εμπειρίες, να συζητήσουν ανοιχτά με τον παιδίατρο, προκειμένου να λάβουν ορισμένες πληροφορίες, ούτως ώστε να καταλάβουν ποιοί είναι οι παράγοντες του κινδύνου της λοίμωξης.

Οπως π.χ. παιδιά που έχουν ανοσοανεπάρκεια που οφείλεται ίσως σε λευχαιμία ή έχουν υποστεί θεραπεία με κορτικοτεροειδή. Αυτά τα παιδιά θα πρέπει να προσέχουν τη λοίμωξη και το πώς γίνεται ο εμβολιασμός. Επίσης και άλλα άτομα όπως γυναίκες εγκυμονούσες ή άτομα που υποσιτίζονται καθώς και ομάδες αυτοχθόνων και ηλικιωμένοι.

Τα άτομα αυτά θα πρέπει να κάνουν τεστ για να δουν τα αντισώματα και να κάνουν δεύτερο εμβολιασμό, ώστε να είναι πιο ασφαλείς».

Η Παιδίατρος Μπέτη Μεσάζου-Τραπέτσα είναι ιδρύτρια της παιδιατρικής κλινικής στο προάστιο του Brighton καθώς επίσης συνιδρύτρια και μέλος του Δ.Σ. της Ένωσης Ελλήνων Ιατρών Αυστραλίας. Η εν λόγω Ένωση συμμετέχει ενεργά στη γέφυρα επικοινωνίας και συνεργασίας και οικοδομείται μεταξύ των Ελλήνων επιστημόνων ανά τον κόσμο.

DOCTORS IN TRAINING

Voluntary Assisted Dying is now legal - What you need to know

The Voluntary Assisted Dying Act

The "voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2017" [link] was passed into law by the Victorian Parliament on November 29, 2017 and came into effect on June 19, 2019.

Patient Resources

The Victorian Department of Health and Human Services, "Health Victoria" has made online resources available to patients interested in accessing voluntary assisted dying under the heading, "Community and consumer information" [link]

The above is an excerpt from Health Victoria's publication titled "Voluntary Assisted Dying - Information for people considering voluntary assisted dying".

Eligibility criteria

Health Victoria states that to be eligible, patients must be adult Victorian residents of decision-making capacity "suffering from an incurable, advanced and progressive disease, illness or medical condition, who are experiencing intolerable suffering. The condition must be assessed by two medical practitioners to be expected to cause death within six months.

"There is an exception for a person suffering from a neurodegenerative condition, where instead the condition must be expected to cause death within 12 months....

"Mental illness or disability alone are not grounds for access to voluntary assisted dying, but people who meet all other criteria, and who have a disability or mental illness, will not be denied access to voluntary assisted dying."

Health Victoria acknowledges: "Some people may find issues relating to end of life care upsetting. If reading the material on this site or thinking about end of life care has raised some issues regarding grief and bereavement or personal crisis, the helplines below provide telephone support and counselling 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Some services may also provide online assistance (depending on the service).

Health practitioner information---rights, obligations and conscientious objection

Only a patient may initiate a request for VAD; their family or carers may not. And although a patient may raise the topic of VAD with a doctor, a doctor may not raise it with a patient.

Health Victoria states that once a patient requests access to VAD, the doctor has the legal right to accept or decline to "participate in the VAD process".

However, the doctor needs to inform the patient if they do not wish to participate and must not deliberately obstruct patient access to the process.

A doctor with a conscientious objection is also under no legal obligation to refer to a doctor who will participate. This contrasts with the Abortion Law Reform Act 2008 where a doctor in Victoria with a conscientious objection is compelled by law to refer to a doctor who has no conscientious objection, and to perform an abortion in an emergency (if qualified to do so).

Doctors' Support Services

Health Victoria acknowledges:

"The voluntary assisted dying process may be an overwhelming and emotional experience for medical practitioners, health practitioners and health service staff who provide care and support for the patient. Health practitioners should be encouraged to access support programs through their health services or professional associations."

GREEK AUSTRALIAN DEMENTIA STUDY



Mathew Staios is a Greek Australian Clinical Neuropsychologist, attached to Monash University, where he is adapting and norming a battery of cognitive tests for use within the ageing Greek Australian community. At present, valid tests to assist with the diagnosis of cognitive impairment do not exist for use within non-English speaking groups and the use of current tests have been reported to result in a high rate of misdiagnosis (i.e., 2-3 times higher).

Mathew will develop 25 new tests to assist with the diagnosis of dementia and strokes specifically for the ageing Greek Australian community. In order to determine how sensitive and specific these tests are, comparisons between the healthy sample and sample of people with dementia is necessary. Mathew is asking all Melbourne based medical doctors to assist with recruiting a sample of ageing Greek with a diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease or mix AD/Vascular dementia. This study has been cleared by the Monash Ethics Committee and he is currently in the process of collecting data. If you are able to assist Mathew, please contact him so that he can fill you in on the study and provide you with the selection criteria.




